COMING LIVE FROM JWG 2024 Summer Weaving and Spinning Classes

The Summer Classes Task Force members have begun dressing the looms to be ready for students to begin weaving on Day 1. These hands-on instructional classes for a maximum 10 weavers and 10 spinners begin June 8th at 10:00 AM. There are <u>still open seats for 2 weavers</u> <u>and 7 spinners</u>, but you must be paid in full by May 11th, the date of our next meeting (and picnic at Judy Jull's home). Time: 10:00 AM - 2:00 PM each Saturday, lunch provided
Where: Fort Caroline Community Center
Cost: \$ 180 - Weaving OR Spinning Class
\$ 50 - Deposit with Balance Due by May 11
(Scholarship funds are available - See your Guild Handbook for details)

Professional weaving instructors will teach you through lectures and experiences of hand weaving on five different, 4 shaft looms, measuring yarn, dressing a loom, reading drafts and using other weaving tools. Likewise spinning students will be professionally taught the mechanics of various wheels, the properties of various fibers, fiber prep, spinning yarn and the various drafting techniques among other vital information needed to perfect your spinning technique. Weaving and spinning tools and equipment will be provided along with yarn or fiber and a community lunch each day. Instructors and experienced helpers will be with you at the loom or wheel to guide you through the processes. Your own handwoven samples of five different weave patterns from 5 different looms or your own handspun will be your takeaway along with the basics of weaving or spinning to guide you through your own projects at home. Do not miss this opportunity to expand your enjoyment of textile arts!

The tasks are as follows:

Set Up - arrive 8:30 am to move looms, warping boards, spinning wheels, supplies to the meeting room from storage, and set up tables & chairs.

Clean Up - after class, move looms and other equipment into storage, return chairs and tables to original places.

Weaving assistant - help as needed with advancing the warp, tension, broken warp, etc.

Warping assistant - help as needed with warping.

Hospitality - set up/clean up snacks, coffee, lunch, ensure the lunch has been ordered, and coordinate the delivery.




April 6--Tartan Day!
